What does it take to redesign a learning community? As you will learn when you flip through these pages. FJA embraces change and innovation from the classrooms to the boardroom, from the performance stage to the laboratory, and from the art room to the chapel. Redesigning our learning community started with a commitment to work collaboratively toward the common goal of enhancing the learning experience for each student at FJA. We convened focus groups of students, parents, faculty, administrators, and potential parents. We collected their feedback about FJA and acted on it. We formed an Educational Revisioning Team (ERT) and worked closely with outside consultants to develop an educational vision that was unique to FJA. The Revisioning Team, made up of faculty, students, staff, a trustee and parent, proposed changes in line with our new vision and mission and developed priorities and action steps.

Change that is meaningful and sustained requires communal buy-in and support. The William Davidson Foundation provided critical funding, trustees engaged in key discussions around mission and rebranding, and teachers and staff developed an educational vision. This extensive process of gathering feedback, setting standards, and identifying goals, led to changes such as a reformulated schedule (with a later start time), revised graduation requirements, and new electives and core classes in Jewish and General Studies like engineering, advanced and updated visual arts, acting, and a new honors and core Rabbinics and Bible track. We introduced unique experiential opportunities like trips to Montana, Washington DC, Appalachia, AIPAC, and the Robotraffic competition at the Technion in

Israel. These opportunities will provide our students with authentic and impactful learning opportunities beyond the walls of the classroom. New learning spaces within our building are also being developed. FJA acquired the lower level of the JCC and completed renovations so it now contains a retrofitted state-ofthe-art theatre, dance studio and a planned student center with collaborative learning spaces designed by students.

As you are all aware, this March we faced the challenge of moving from in-person instruction to distance learning. This meant pressing "pause" on some of our intended innovations, such as the trips to Montana and Washington DC, and dealing with unexpected temporary challenges. While the year did not quite go the way we had planned, teachers, staff, and administrators made an incredible transition. They shifted to a distance learning program where teachers and staff continued to support students, while providing exceptional academic instruction and social-emotional support.

Through expected and unexpected change, our FJA community remains as strong as ever. Our teachers delivered creative lessons, the JAG delivered yard signs to our new and current families, and our community served up a fabulous senior send off parade with a memorable outdoor commencement (albeit delayed) in August.

May we continue to go from strength to strength and may your family enjoy a year filled with blessing and joy.

While it seems like a lifetime ago, it was only last year when school often started at daybreak with stars still visible in the sky. Sleepy students drifted into school and tardies were a common issue that we discussed regularly. Each morning when I greeted students, my exuberant "good mornings," were often met with a head nod or grunt in response.

We announced that we would change our start time to 8:30 am just one year ago. One year later, students are no longer rubbing their eyes or shaking the cobwebs out of their groggy heads. It was quickly apparent that a move from our 7:30 am start time, as it had been since we opened our doors

20 years ago, has had a significant impact on student performance and engagement. Teachers report, and we have noticed, from our morning greetings to our afternoon goodbyes, significant improvement in positive energy, greater interaction with peers and teachers, and more focused attention, curiosity, and creativity with regards to learning. In a survey conducted earlier this year, students enthusiastically expressed support for the new start time. They believe they are more productive throughout the day and teachers report significant improvement in student engagement.

It is therefore no surprise that states from California to Michigan are

considering the FJA model! This is just one of the significant changes and innovations we have made to improve healthy student growth, development, and engagement. While this change may have required some adjustment to logistics like carpools and schedules by parents and faculty, the overall impact is positive on our students and the FJA community.


Thank you to the administrators, students, faculty, and parents who helped us make this change a reality. We look forward to your continued partnership in creating the best educational environment for our students.

COURSES, CURRICULUM, CHANGES, OH MY!

This has been a year of momentous change for the students and staff of Frankel Jewish Academy. The most obvious difference between this and previous vears has, of course, been that born out of necessity when faced with a global pandemic. Our students, staff, and faculty were told by the governor that Michigan schools were closed to in-person instruction on a Thursday night, and within a week, they were learning remotely -- without missing a beat. This change was momentous in that it radically altered the way in which teachers taught and students learned; however, it also reinforced those foundations upon which our school has so consistently found success. While this transition was difficult, it provided an opportunity for our students, staff, and faculty to, in the face of something utterly unprecedented, rise up and prove themselves exceptional.

And though in years to come, the three month period of unanticipated change is what we will likely most remember, there were many anticipated changes that preceded the pandemic that positively shaped FJA.

- School Start Time: This year the school start time was moved from 7:30 am to 8:30 am. This decision was made after extensive research and community feedback made clear to us that our students needed more sleep. Since sleep is both a cognitive enhancer and stress reliever, as you can imagine: FJA was a happier place.
- Schedule: This year we completely restructured our school schedule to provide greater variation to class meeting time, when classes met, and the length of the school day. This more collegiate structure allowed for greater student focus, flexibility in scheduling, and student pursuit of individual interests.
- Courses and Individual Choice: Through conversations that evolved during our educational revisioning process, it became apparent that more choices for students in their course selections and greater variety in their possible educational pathways was needed. As a result, we added nearly twenty new classes across all academic areas—core and elective, Jewish and General Studies—much to the benefit of our students and staff.
- Graduation Requirements: FJA students now have more individualized educational options with greater



choices for classes in a wider number of areas and elective options than ever before.

- Teacher Learning and Support: Professional development for staff and faculty is now more closely aligned with the educational vision of the school in ways that support both collaboration between teachers and shared practice across curricular areas. Moreover, teacher evaluation is more practically aligned with teaching and learning goals and designed to be more supportive of good educational practice.
- Administrative Structure: The administrative structure of the school has been streamlined to allow for both greater support of the educational community and wider flexibility in the way in which this support is provided.

So this has, indeed, been a year of monumental change for FJA. There have been both anticipated and unanticipated changes to be sure, but these changes that have, despite some challenges interspersed, brought out the very best in our school community. We have been invigorated by what we have faced and energized by the many changes we have put into place.

What was a watershed moment that could have moved the school forward or backward, as such moments are want to be, has found us thriving. As we look to the next twenty years, know that the path we have set for ourselves is not one that we will rest upon. Rather, these changes are the beginning of still greater opportunities in years to come.

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A NEW IMAGE

Change is in full swing at FJA. A later start time, revised class schedule, more electives, and, you may have noticed - a new look!

In our 20th year, it is time for our image to represent all of the changes we have made. How does a Jewish college preparatory school with an environment that is caring, innovative, joyful and supportive, represent itself through images, colors, and words? We spent time considering crests and shields, menorahs and torahs, stars and symbols, and we looked at our mission statement. After much collaboration and consideration, we identified a symbol that is as Jewish as apple pie is American and colors that are as vibrant and energetic as our students.

Introducing our new logo - the FJA pomegranate. It is a symbol that is timeless and fresh; it represents tradition and renewal, it is one of the seven species mentioned in the Bible as native to Israel, it is the fruit that inaugurates Rosh HaShanah, the new year, and whose seeds are said to represent the Mitzvot, the commandments of the Torah. The pomegranate is much more than a fruit, as Frankel Jewish Academy is much more than a school. Our new tagline, "Own Your Journey. Discover Your Tomorrow." expresses our belief that each student is unique, with interests and skills waiting to be discovered and honed.

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FJA Top 1% STEM School

FJA has been named one of the nation's best for science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM), according to *Newsweek* magazine. FJA is ranked in the top 1% of schools in Michigan and the top 2% of all high schools in the United States in this report of the 2020 Best STEM Schools. Newsweek partnered with STEM.org to rank America's Best STEM High Schools. The schools were ranked based on data collected from 2015 to 2019. The research determined which schools provided the best STEM experience for students while positioning them for post-secondary study.

The top five thousand schools made the final list out of over thirty thousand high schools in the United States. From that five thousand, FJA ranked 514 - better than the vast majority of the schools in the Detroit Metro area. FJA is also ranked #3 of all Jewish Schools (that have a high school) in the United States!

"This recognition from Newsweek and STEM.org demonstrates the strength of Frankel Jewish Academy's programs. With the addition of our Genesis STEAM lab. we have been able to involve our students in robotics, coding, graphic design, and critical thinking in nearly every subject in our school," said Head of School Rabbi Azaryah Cohen. "When our students won first prize in an international robotics competition at the Technion in Israel, it validated all of our work in science, technology, engineering, art, and math. Our graduates enter the world with technology at their fingertips."

FJA on the FRONT LINES FJA MAKES FACE SHIELDS FOR FIRST RESPONDERS

When medical supplies were running low due to the rapid spread of Covid-19, two FJA staff members, Director of Innovation and Technology Dan Bourdeau and STEAM lab manager Dale Rogers used the school's 3D printers to create protective face shields for the medical community.

Mr. Bourdeau and Mr. Rogers created a plethora of masks in the spring, a time when essential medical equipment was running low and was desperately needed. FJA was able to coordinate pick-ups for nurses and doctors stationed at local mobile COVID-19 testing sites.

FJA received a few special donations to support production of the face shields. These enabled Mr. Bourdeau and Mr. Rogers to continue making shields throughout the spring and to satisfy the needs of Jewish organizations, hospitals, and private medical facilities. They were guoted in the Detroit Jewish News at the time, saying "This whole process has been gratifying to be able to help in some very small way."
